Be aware that shortly after the sermon, the catechumens, i.e., those preparing for Baptism & Chrismation, will be dismissed, but you are invited to stay for the rest of the service.

To All: Please be aware that Holy Communion is open only to Orthodox Christians who have prepared themselves for worthy participation in the Mystery through prayer, fasting, and a recent confession to a priest (within the last month or so). We should be modestly dressed and present to hear "Blessed is the Kingdom" (in *unusual* circumstances no later than the Gospel reading), and not have missed Sunday Liturgy for three or more weeks in a row.

The Mission Council meets today after Liturgy. Anyone wishing to sit in is welcome.

The Special Freewill Offering today will be for our priest. Next week, for NTOM (North Texas Orthodox Missions).

The Nativity Fast lasts through the Liturgy on Nativity morning (Dec 25). We abstain from meat and dairy for the whole fast, and fish, wine (alcohol), and oil (except when permitted per the wall calendar) and marital relations so that we can give more in alms, pray more effectively, and open our hearts more widely to God.

Nativity Lent Almsgiving: As is our practice, as part of our almsgiving during the Nativity Fast, we shall collect items for Woman to Woman and Interfaith Ministries, two worthy local charities. Boxes will be placed under the bookstore table with sheets describing what sort of items are needed.

Parish Membership: if you want or consider yourself to be a member of St. Maximus but have not filled out a parish membership form, please do so. They may be found on the candle table. Give it to Fr. Justin or any council member. Thank you.

From Saint Maximus

Nobody who accepts, as partners in his struggle for virtue, any of the four demons we have mentioned [pride, self-esteem, desire for popularity, hypocrisy] can build for the Lord. If he does accept any of them, as a result of his efforts he will not find God, but will be confirmed in the passion that he consolidates through his virtue.

The demons that wage war on us through our shortcomings in virtue are those that teach unchastity, drunkenness, avarice, and envy. Those who wage war on us through our excessive zeal for virtue teach conceit, self-esteem, and pride; they secretly pervert what is commendable into what is reprehensible. *Various Texts 3.76, 3.77*

Resurrectional Troparion, tone 8

Thou didst descend from on high, O tenderhearted One. / Thou didst accept the three-day burial to free us from our passions. / O Lord, our life and resurrection, glory to Thee.

St. Maximus, Troparion, tone 3

By an outpouring of the Holy Spirit / thou didst pour forth Christ's sacred teachings, / thou didst expound with Divine authority / the self-emptying of God the Word / and wast radiant in thy confession of the True Faith:/ O, Glorious Father Maximus / pray to Christ our God / to grant us His great mercy.

St. Ambrose of Milan, Troparion, tone 4

Thou was revealed to thy flock as a rule of faith, / an image of humility, and a teacher of abstinence, / Because of thy humility the heights were opened to thee, / because of thy poverty riches were granted to thee. / O holy hierarch, Father Ambrose, / intercede with Christ God // that our souls may be saved.

Resurrectional Kontakion, tone 8

Having risen from the tomb Thou didst waken the dead and raise Adam, / and Eve exulteth in Thy Resurrection, / and the ends of the world keep festival for Thy rising from the dead, O Most Merciful One.

The thrice-radiant Light which abode in thy soul / showed thee to be a chosen vessel / revealing divine things to the ends of the earth, / O blessed Maximus, who givest utterance to concepts hard to grasp, / and manifestly proclaimest unto all // the transcendent and unoriginate Trinity.
