Finally, the one who perfects it with the holy perfume of the knowledge of a worshipper of the Holy Trinity possesses that of a bishop.

And they perish when finally they are obliterated through detachment of soul, since they no longer find anything by which they might gain and do battle against it. Resurrectional Troparion, Tone 3

Let those in Heaven rejoice, / let those on Earth be glad; / for the Lord hath wrought a mighty act with His arm./ He hath trampled down death by death; / He hath become the first-born of the dead.
/ From the womb of hell hath He delivered us, // and hath granted the world great mercy.

St. Maximus, Troparion, tone 3

By an outpouring of the Holy Spirit / thou didst pour forth Christ's sacred teachings, / thou didst expound with Divine authority / the self-emptying of God the Word / and wast radiant in thy confession of the True Faith:/ O, Glorious Father Maximus / pray to Christ our God // to grant us His great mercy.

Ss. Marcian and Martyrius, tone 4

In their sufferings, O Lord, / Thy Martyrs Marcian and Martyrius received imperishable crowns from Thee, our God. / For possessed of Thy might, / they cast down the tormentors and crushed the feeble audacity of the demons. // By their supplications save Thou our souls.

Resurrectional Kontakion, Tone 3
