True, it's sometimes permitted, due to urgent matters, not to go to all the services, but when possible, it's regarded as a necessary duty. Here in the Skete we even make the rounds of the cells on feast days, so that no one evades church services.

### **From Saint Maximus**

What pleases God is love, temperance, contemplation, and prayer. What pleases the flesh is gluttony, intemperance, and what contributes to them. Therefore, "those who are in the flesh cannot please God. And those who are Christ's have crucified their flesh with its passions and lusts."

When the mind inclines towards God, it keeps the body as a servant and allows it nothing more than what is necessary for life. But when it inclines towards the flesh, it becomes a servant of the passions and always makes provision for its lusts.

If you want to prevail over your thoughts, take care of your passions, and you will easily drive them from your mind. Thus, for fornication, fast, keep vigil, work hard, keep to yourself. For anger and hurt, disdain reputation and dishonor and material things. For grudges, pray for the one who has hurt you and you will be rid of them.

## Troparia and Kontakia for August 22<sup>nd</sup>



### Resurrectional Troparion, tone 4

Having learned the radiant proclamation of the Resurrection from the Angel, /the women disciples of the Lord cast off the ancestral curse, /and, boasting, told the Apostles: /Death hath been despoiled, Christ God is risen, /granting the world great mercy.

### Dormition Troparion, tone 1

In giving birth, thou didst preserve thy virginity, / in falling asleep thou didst not forsake the world, O Theotokos. Thou wast translated to life, O thou who art the Mother of Life, / and by thy prayers thou dost deliver our souls from death.

### St. Maximus, Troparion, tone 3

#### St. Agathonicus, Troparion, tone 4

In his sufferings, O Lord,/Thy Martyr Agathonicus received an imperishable crown from Thee, our God./For possessed of Thy might,/he cast down the tormentors and crushed the feeble audacity of the demons./By his supplications do Thou save our souls.

### Resurrectional Kontakion, tone 4

My Saviour and Deliverer as God/ hath raised out of the grave the earth-born from their bonds / and He hath shattered the gates of hell / and as Master / He hath risen on the third day.

### St. Maximus, Kontakion tone 8 *Serbian Melody*

Let us the faithful praise with fitting hymns / that lover of the Holy Trinity, great Maximus, / who clearly taught the divinely-given Faith: / that we should give glory unto Christ our God, / Who, but one person, hath in very truth / two natures, wills, and energies. / Let us cry to him: // Rejoice, divine herald of the Faith.

### St. Agathonicus, Kontakion, tone 1

Having, acquired a good name, O divinely wise one, / thou didst convert wicked men to the Faith, / not fearing tortures, O glorious Agathonicus. / Wherefore, thou hast become an heir to good things, / and with those who suffered with thee // hast thou received worthy crowns.

### Dormition, Kontakion, tone 2

Neither the tomb nor death could hold the Theotokos, / who is constant in prayer and our firm hope in her intercessions. / For being the Mother of Life, she was translated to life / by the One who dwelt in her virginal womb.
