We'll observe it with an extended Vigil Friday night the 20th at 7:00 and Divine Liturgy Saturday morning at 9:00, followed by a meal and a lecture by Fr. Justin on simple thoughts and passionate thoughts in St. Maximus. For the feast, the parish will provide smoked brisket, but we look to you to provide whatever is needed to make the day festive. Great Vespers will be served Saturday evening at 5:00 instead of Vigil. Your presence will help make the day festive.

House Blessings: Sign up on the sheet in the hall or make an appointment with the priest if you want your home blessed.

Coffee Hour is a ministry to facilitate the growth of community among us who share a common faith in Christ. It is good for all of us to participate in it, first by coming to eat and to get to know others better. But for this to happen, two other things must happen: someone must bring food, set it out, and clean up afterwards. Most of us have part one down, but too few of us contribute regularly to the other essential parts. If you eat regularly but don't regularly bring food, please bring something to share at least some of the time. If you truly cannot bring food, make it a point to share regularly in the set up and clean up (which can include the weekly cleaning of the church). Currently, people at the end of the line find very little food. All of us should take less our first time through, monitor what our children take (or serve them if

they are young), and not go back for seconds until everyone has had firsts. (We have small plates rather than large dinner plates out for a reason.) Also, please remember to encourage our guests and elderly to go first.

Commemorations: Please try to submit your Sunday commemorations Saturday night (or earlier) whenever you can.

Tithes, Offerings & Attendance: Bringing our tithes and offerings to the temple of God is part of our worship of God and supports our efforts to proclaim the fullness of the Gospel of Christ in Denton through the establishment of a permanent Orthodox parish and new missions in Denton County and north Texas. Checks should be made out to St. Maximus Orthodox Church and placed in the slot in the candle table (or in the basket passed during service). There are also boxes for alms (those in need) and our building fund.

From Saint Maximus 400 Chapters on Love

1.67 While passions such as forgetfulness and ignorance affect but one of the soul's three aspects — the incensive, the desiring or the intelligent — listlessness alone seizes control of all the soul's powers and rouses almost all the passions together. That is why this passion is more serious than all the others. Hence our Lord has given us an excellent remedy against it, saying: "You will gain possession of your souls through your patient endurance' (Luke 21:19).

1.68 Never strike any of the brethren, especially without reason, in case he is unable to bear the affliction and leaves the monastery. For then you would never escape the reproach of your conscience. It would always bring you distress in the time of prayer and divert your intellect from intimate communion with God.

1.69 Shun all suspicions and all persons that cause you to take offence. If you are offended by anything, whether intended or unintended, you do not know the way of peace, which through love brings the lovers of divine knowledge to the knowledge of God.
