On Spiritual Exertions, *St. Porphyrios*

Listen to what St. Ignatius Branchanivnov says in his book, *On the Prayer of Jesus*: "Every physical and spiritual task which does not involved pain, toil and trouble never bears fruit for the person who engages in it for the Kingdom of Heaven is taken by violence and *the violent lay hold of it*—'violence' here meaning the laborious exercise of the body in everything."

When you love Christ, you exert yourself, but in blessed exertions. You suffer, but with joy. You make prostrations and pray because these are things you crave for with divine craving. They are at once pain and longing, passion and yearning and exaltation and joy and love. Prostrations and vigils and fasting are exertions which are made for the Beloved, exertions in order to experience Christ. But his exertion is not made under duress; you don't protest and rebel. Whatever you do under compulsion is very harmful both to you and to the work you are doing. The pressure and coercion provoke opposition. Exertion for Christ, true desire of Christ is love, sacrifice, and dissolution of self.)

Building Fund Watch

Building fund balance: \$181,570.88.

New goal: \$200,000 by year's end. We tentatively aim to raise \$500,000 before we start building.

New Icons of Christ and the Theotokos have been commissioned (and are being painted now) to replace the prints for veneration on the anaglogia. There is an opportunity to sponsor or help sponsor them. Please see Fr. Justin.

Tithes, Offerings & Attendance: Bringing our tithes and offerings to the temple of God is part of our worship of God and supports our efforts to proclaim the fullness of the Gospel of Christ in Denton through the establishment of a permanent Orthodox parish and new missions in Denton County and north Texas. From Saint Maximus 400 Chapters on Love

4.65 One ignorant of the spiritual path is not on his guard against impassioned conceptual images, but devotes himself entirely to the flesh. He is either a glutton, or licentious, or full of resentment, anger and rancor. As a result he darkens his intellect, or he practices excessive asceticism and so confuses his mind.

4.66 Scripture does not forbid anything which God has given us for our use; but it condemns immoderation and thoughtless behavior. For instance, it does not forbid us to eat, or to beget children, or to possess material things and to administer them properly. But it does forbid us to be gluttonous, to fornicate and so on. It does not forbid us to think of these things — they were made to be thought of — but it forbids us to think of them with passion.

From St. Porphyrios: Prayer at night is best...Bodily exertion cause the body to protest and complain and react, but it is unable to make the soul lax in prayer. You simply turn the radio up louder; you listen to the music, you enjoy it and you don't hear the complaints. I mean that by intensifying the prayer, the prayer neutralizes the weariness, Before complaining about your bodily exhaustion, start praying because when you complain grace departs and you are left with your own strength.

Troparia and Kontakia for December 2nd

Resurrectional Troparion, tone 2

When Thou, didst descend to death, O Life Immortal / Thou didst slay Hell with the lightning-flash of Thy Divinity, / and, when from the nether regions Thou didst raise the dead, / all the powers of Heaven cried out: / 'O Giver of life, Christ our God, glory to Thee!'

St. Maximus, Troparion, tone 3

By an outpouring of the Holy Spirit / thou didst pour forth Christ's sacred teachings, / thou didst expound with Divine authority / the self-emptying of God the Word / and wast radiant in thy confession of the True Faith: / O, Glorious Father Maximus / pray to Christ our God / to grant us His great mercy.

St. Prophyrios, Troparion, tone 1

As a citizen of the desert. / That offspring of Evvoia and Elder of all of Greece, / the mystic of theology and genuine friend of Christ, / Porphyrios was filled with gifts of grace from childhood. / So let us honor him. / He delivereth those oppressed by demons, / he cureth the sick who shout with faith and gratitude: / "Glory to Him who gave thee His might; / glory to Him who sanctified thee; / glory to Him who worketh healings for all through thee."

Resurrectional Kontakion, tone 2

Thou didst rise from the grave, all -powerful Saviour; / and Hades, seeing the wonder, was affrighted; / and the dead arose; and creation, beholding, rejoiceth with Thee; / and with Thee Adam also is glad; / and the world, O my Saviour, hymneth Thee forever.

St. Maximus, Kontakion tone 8 *Serbian Melody*

Let us the faithful praise with fitting hymns / that lover of the Holy Trinity, great Maximus, / who clearly taught the divinely-given Faith: / that we should give glory unto Christ our God, / Who, but one person, hath in very truth / two natures, wills, and energies. / Let us cry to him: // Rejoice, divine herald of the Faith.

St. Porphyrios, Kontakion, tone 8

Let us extol Saint Porphyrios wholeheartedly, / that consecrated holy temple of the Comforter / and beloved of the pure Lady Theotokos. / For he loveth all people, curing and protecting us, / and he prayeth for us, that we attain to theosis. / So we shout to him: "Rejoice, father Porphyrios!"
